



Ask the Proofreaders

It's Not Preposterous to Use the Preposition "From"!

Struggling with a topic to cover in the next "Ask the Proofreaders" column, I contacted Donna for ideas. She offered the following phrase: "He just graduated high school." Apparently this misuse of the word "graduate" has been bugging Donna. Considering the time of year and the fact that résumé writers tend to get busy with requests from new graduates, I can image that it's more frequently bothersome.



I quickly did a Google search of "He just graduated high school" and was amazed by how many hits I got (apparently this misuse is quite common). Now, I could provide you with an in-depth lesson about "transitive" and "intransitive" verbs and how the word "graduate" is both, but why clutter your mind (and inbox) with more information than you need? The point is this: You can't graduate a high school or a college...or any other institution of learning. It's simply not possible!

By definition, the act of graduating is something a school does to a student, not

something a student does to a school. Schools graduate students. Students graduate *from* schools.

The local high school graduated 300 students this year, is correct. The school, itself, is doing the graduating to the students or the students were graduated by the school.

Donna graduated from college is also correct. So is This year, 500 students graduated from Donna's college.

Recently, usage has become sloppy, with the preposition *from* being omitted. Are we all so busy that we need to save time by cutting prepositions from our sentences? It's grammatically correct to say/write *I was graduated from school*, *The school graduated its students*, or even *I graduated from school*, but PLEASE do not use *I graduated school*. It's incorrect...plus it bothers Donna (and anyone else who appreciates proper grammar as much as she and I).

Before I sign off, I have a book I'd like to recommend (I learned of it while researching proper usage of *graduate*).

Literally, the Best Language Book Ever: Annoying Words and Abused Phrases You Should Never Use Again by Paul Yeager. The book consists of words, phrases, and expressions that should be avoided for various reasons, ranging from being grammatically incorrect to being overly trendy, being trite or being just plain annoying!

I haven't purchased the book yet, but when I do, you can expect to read about it in future issues of *The NRWA Connection*.
